The Confession of a Club Officer

In the spring of each year, following our club's by-laws, a nomination committee is formed from all the DTM's in our club. They will nominate and vote for whom they believe should be the next club officers. Once this decision is made, the nomination committee will present their

selection before the club who will then vote to approve or reject their selections.

In the spring of 2008, Marcia Barney approached me after a meeting for the spring conference we were hosting and asked me if I would be interested in being the club's president for the 2008-2009 year. I was shocked. I did not know what to think or say. After some very convincing minutes Marcia had me agreeing to have my name placed in nomination. Within a few weeks I was informed that I would be the club's next president.

The experience of being the club's president is a wonderful opportunity to improve your leadership skills. The President's role is to work with the other club officers to set the club goals for the year. Then insure that the club meets those goals. The President also is the one who presides over the business session of each club meetings. If you are lucky, you get the chance to experience at least one business session in which you are tested on Robert's Rules of Order. I had no clue as to what Robert's Rules of Order was until I went to the fall conference. At the conference I was part of a training session led by Marcia and Butch Barney. This was a great learning experience because I learned that the best thing to do if you are not skilled in Robert's Rule of Order is to appoint a Parliamentarian. This is a person who is well experienced in Robert's Rules. You can call upon your Parliamentarian if you get into a situation in a meeting which you are not sure which way to turn. They can assist you in making sure you follow the proper protocol. When we had our next meeting, I appointed Marcia as my Parliamentarian. This came in handy when not to long afterwards, Marcia and John Clark decided to test me on Robert Rules of Order. This experience has helped me to improve my confidence in my leadership skills at work and in my role of chairing a committee for the March of Dimes.

Last spring, Marcia once again approached me and asked me to be the Vice President of Education for the upcoming year. I knew from my experience as President that this role is the most important and challenging position. I decided that I was up for the challenge. The Vice President of Education is responsible for scheduling all Toastmasters roles for each meeting, creating the agenda and plan, and organizing the club's contests.

The VP of Education is also responsible to make sure that each Toastmaster meets their desired goals, along with the club's goals. Holding this position this year has been fulfilling personally. It has allowed me to improve on my organizational skills in a changing environment. Making sure new members get added to the schedule while still helping other member meet their goals. Knowing that I was responsible for all the important areas, it helped me make sure I do not put off things to the last minute.

If you are approached to fill one of the club's offices for the next year, take up the challenge. It builds your confidence to think our club's DTMs have the faith and trust in you to put the club's future in your hands. Take the chance. As my mom has always told me when trying to make a hard decision, "Hey, Columbus took a chance"! So I challenge you to accept the opportunity learn and improve on your leadership skills. I know for me, it has been an honor to server such a wonderful and distinguished club.

When You Are The Vote Counter - -

The vote counter should rank all participants in each category, but should not include the vote counter's vote except in case of a tie. This insures that the result of balloting will never be a tie.

The Presiding Officer will ask for the results of balloting near the end of the meeting. The Vote Counter should give the results from a standing position near the Vote Counter's seat. Please do not give the number of votes for each person, just the name of the winner in each of the three categories.

The vote counter should count the votes as soon as they are received, so that presentation of the awards is not delayed. While the Toastmaster of the Meeting or General Evaluator should invite all members to vote, some members may choose not to do so. If you, as Vote Counter, receive 17 votes when 20 members are present, don't be surprised.

Some members also pass their short evaluations to the vote counter. These should be passed on to the appropriate speaker.
